



Here's how we put your dollars to work last year:

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT AND INTEGRATION SUPPORT

We welcomed **152** refugees, partnering with volunteers to set-up

61 apartments, providing cultural orientation and case management, and connecting individuals and families to community resources.

72% of new arrivals fled the Democratic Republic of Congo. We

provided intensive case management to **21** refugees who are facing particularly challenging barriers to adjusting to life in Greensboro.

We assisted refugees with **155** job place-

ments with a **\$12.00** average starting

wage. **80** were job upgrades for refugees who have lived in Greensboro longer than 6 months. The Employment Team generated

\$3.6 million in annual earnings for refugees.

IMMIGRATION LEGAL SERVICES

Former CWSG Case Manager Bruce Chettri became **DOJ accredited** and stepped into a newly-added full-time position in our Immigration Legal Services Program in November.

We assisted 149 applicants in becoming U.S. citizens and

submitted **105** applications for green cards for former refugees.

EDUCATION AND ENGAGEMENT

We participated in 87 community engagement events, including trainings with faith communities, partner agencies, and government bodies as well as events such as the 2nd Annual Unity Festival. We

received over **4,500** hours of volunteer support.

NEW INITIATIVES AND RECOGNITIONS

CWSG was **1 Of 8** national recipients of Catholic Legal Immigration Network's **National Immigrant Empowerment Project** multi-year grant to cultivate refugee and immigrant leaders and empower the local immigrant community to advance immigrant and refugee interests. Our organizer held the first refugee leadership meeting in November.
